Analysis of Purged and New Voters in North Carolina by Party, Age Group, Race, and Sex from February 2022 to February 2023


The Voter Purge Project

Introduction:

The following figures show the changes in the North Carolina voting population during the last twelve months, as observed through four categories, party, age group, race, and sex. North Carolina denotes three main political parties—Democratic, Republican, and Libertarian. All other parties are measured together under no party affiliation, along with independent voters. The percentage of purged voters is calculated by comparing the number of voters dropped to the category population at the beginning of the observation period. Similarly, the percentage of new voters is calculated by comparing the amount of voters added to the total number of voters at the end of the observation period.

Analysis by Party


Percentage of Dropped North Carolina Voters by Party

As shown in the figures, a slightly larger percentage of Democratic voters were purged during this time period.

Percentage of New North Carolina Voters by Party





Though they comprise a small portion of North Carolina voters, the Libertarian party saw the largest percentage increase, with double the relative growth of both Democrats and Republicans. The high percentage of growth in the no party affiliation group may indicate an increase in the amount of registered independents. However, it is not possible to determine conclusively based on the available

data—given that there is no differentiation between independents and minor parties.

Analysis by Age Group


Percentage of Dropped North Carolina Voters by Age Group

As expected, the 65+ group had the largest percentage of purged voters. The 25-34 group had the second largest relative drop. Despite the rate of death in this group being smaller than most others, the percentage could be attributed to a number of other factors such as inactivity. The causes of voter purging are listed on the Voter Purge Project website.

Percentage of New North Carolina Voters by Age Group



Promisingly, the 18-24 age group saw a massive percentage increase compared to other groups, with four times the rate of the next highest group. As expected, the percentage growth of each age group slows as age increases.

Analysis by Race


Percentage of Dropped North Carolina Voters by Race

Though comprising a smaller number of voters when compared to total population, Native American voters were purged at the highest percentage, followed by the multi-racial group and Pacific Islander. It is worth noting the large population of undesignated race voters. If distributed among the appropriate group, the 6025 dropped voters could cause significant changes to the purge percentages of each group.

Percentage of New North Carolina Voters by Race



The Pacific Islander group saw the largest percentage growth, though they represent a very small portion of total voters. Interestingly, the other group saw the second largest increase. The reason for this can't be determined with the available data, though it may be related to the fact that North Carolina does not categorize Hispanic Americans under their race categories. This is classified under an ethnicity identifier.

Analysis by Sex


Percentage of Dropped North Carolina Voters by Sex

Nearly the same amount of male and female voters were purged despite there being 550,000 more female voters in the state at the start of the measured period.

As shown in the figures, the undesignated sex group saw the largest increase. This is interesting given the massive increase in the 18-24 voter age group. Further research would need to be done to determine whether the growth in voters who do not identify with a traditional gender is correlated with the increase in younger voters.
